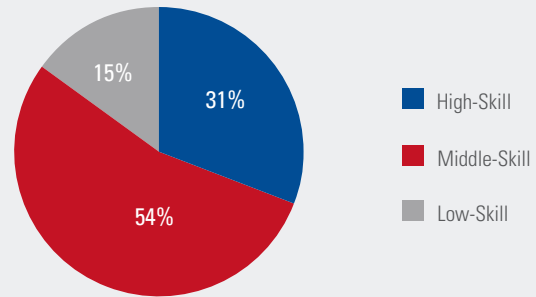


United States' Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's labor market. Key industries in United States are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

Jobs by Skill Level, United States, 2012

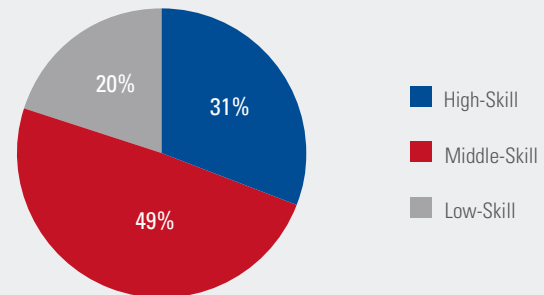
Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong
Fifty-four percent of all jobs in 2012 were middle-skill.

Job Openings by Skill Level, United States, 2012-22

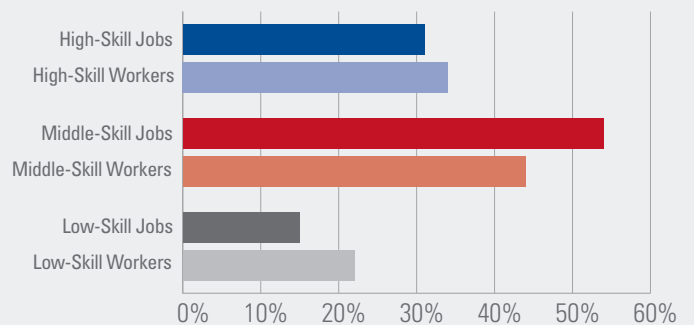
Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs Will Remain Strong

A Middle-Skill Gap
Middle-skill jobs account for 54 percent of United States' labor market, but only 44 percent of the country's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
