
Kansas' Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's and Kansas' labor market. Key industries in Kansas are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong

Fifty-five percent of all jobs in 2015 were middle-skill.

Jobs by Skill Level, Kansas, 2015



Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs Will Remain Strong

Between 2012-2022, 51 percent of job openings will be middle-skill.

Job Openings by Skill Level, Kansas, 2012-2022



A Middle-Skill Gap

Middle-skill jobs account for 55 percent of Kansas' labor market, but only 45 percent of the state's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
