
## Kentucky's Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's and Kentucky's labor market. Key industries in Kentucky are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

### Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong

Fifty-eight percent of all jobs in 2015 were middle-skill.

### Jobs by Skill Level, Kentucky, 2015



# Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs Will Remain Strong

Between 2012-2022, 53 percent of job openings will be middle-skill.

### Job Openings by Skill Level, Kentucky, 2012-2022



### A Middle-Skill Gap

Middle-skill jobs account for 58 percent of Kentucky's labor market, but only 48 percent of the state's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
