

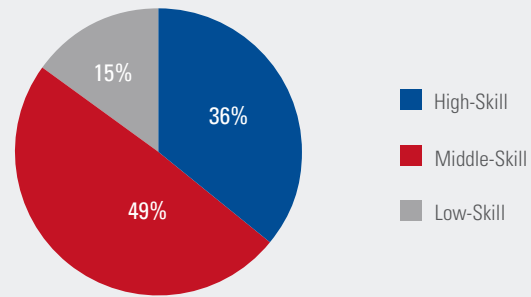
# Connecticut's Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's and Connecticut's labor market. Key industries in Connecticut are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

## Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong

Forty-nine percent of all jobs in 2012 were middle-skill.

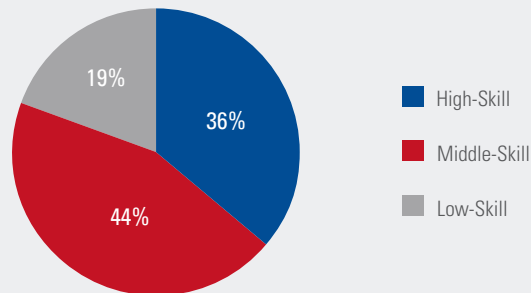

Between 2010-2020, 44 percent of job openings will be middle-skill.

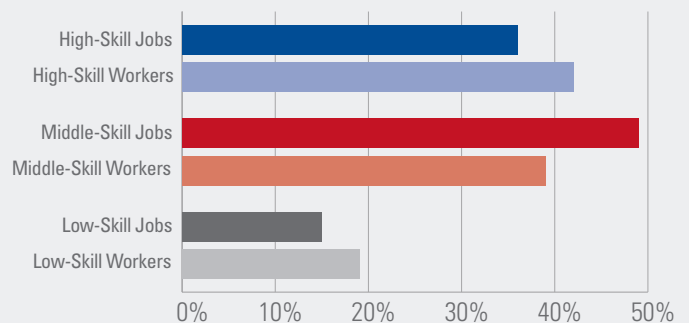

## A Middle-Skill Gap

Middle-skill jobs account for 49 percent of Connecticut's labor market, but only 39 percent of the state's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
