

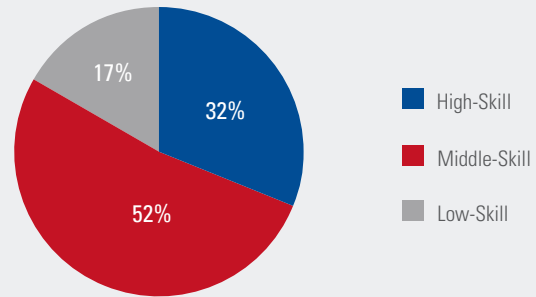
Rhode Island's Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's and Rhode Island's labor market. Key industries in Rhode Island are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong

Fifty-two percent of all jobs in 2012 were middle-skill.

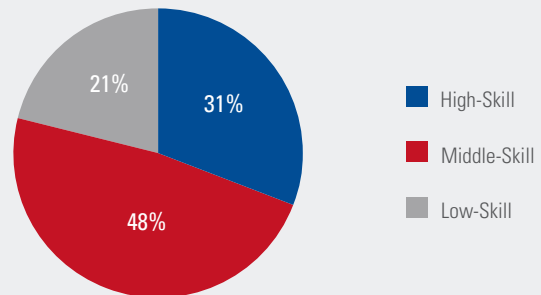

Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs Will Remain Strong

Between 2010-2020, 48 percent of job openings will be middle-skill.

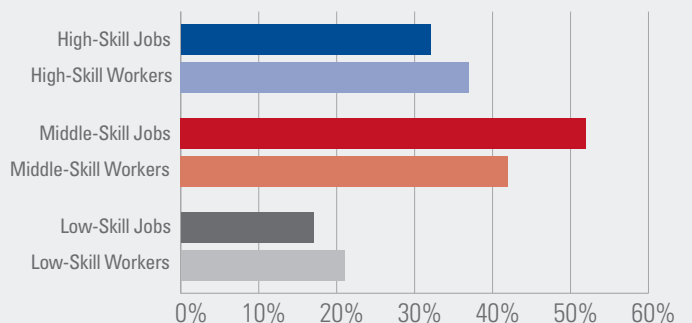

A Middle-Skill Gap

Middle-skill jobs account for 52 percent of Rhode Island's labor market, but only 42 percent of the state's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
