
Texas' Forgotten Middle

Middle-skill jobs, which require education beyond high school but not a four-year degree, make up the largest part of America's and Texas' labor market. Key industries in Texas are unable to find enough sufficiently trained workers to fill these jobs.

Demand for Middle-Skill Jobs is Strong

Fifty-five percent of all jobs in 2012 were middle-skill.

Jobs by Skill Level, Texas, 2012



Between 2010-2020, 49 percent of job openings will be middle-skill.

Job Openings by Skill Level, Texas, 2010-20



A Middle-Skill Gap

Middle-skill jobs account for 55 percent of Texas' labor market, but only 43 percent of the state's workers are trained to the middle-skill level.
